

- Public Policy
- Organizational Policy



Policy is most simply a body of decisions that determine how a group, large or small, will operate. Public policy represents decisions, made by a publicly elected or designated body, that are believed to be in the public interest. Policy made at the organizational level reflects rules and regulations believed to make the organization run well.

Policy should consider

- who benefits (the more the better)
- who might be negatively affected (the fewer the better)
- time required to implement the solution
- associated cost and financing
- political complexities of a the governing structures

At the end of the day, public policy involves making good decisions, for the public good and organizational policies involve making decisions for the organization's good.

- What if you commit to acknowledging where the food you eat together comes from, who grew it, and what their work conditions were like before eating it?
- What if you make an effort to have one locally grown or seasonal item or organic item at each meal?
